# How not to wishcycle

Commonly wishcycled items, why they can't go in recycling and what to do with them instead.

Wishcycling = putting something in the recycling that can't be recycled.

Wishcycling at work or home causes contamination, which leads to nearly a fifth of all recycling being wasted.

Share this with customers and colleagues in your business so they know what to avoid putting in the recycling bin.



### Drinking glasses

#### **WHY NOT**

Will cause imperfections in new glass bottles

#### DO

Wrap broken glass and safely dispose of in general waste



### Soft plastics & film

#### **WHY NOT**

Not widely recycled and needs specialist recycling

#### DO

Take to a supermarket or other collection points



### Foil pouches & crisp packets

#### WHY NOT

Made of metallicised plastic which is not recyclable

#### DO

Dispose of in general waste



# Juice boxes & soup cartons

#### **WHY NOT**

Made of layered cardboard and plastic which is difficult to separate

#### DO

Dispose of in general waste or arrange specialist recycling



#### **Plastic toys**

#### WHY NO

Comprised of hard and moulded plastics that need to be separated

#### DO

Donate to charity or dispose of in general waste



#### Wet cardboard

#### **WHY NOT**

Soggy boxes clog up the machinery during automated sorting of mixed recycling

#### DO

Add to compost or dispose of in general waste



### Toothpaste tubes

#### WHY NOT

Contaminated with residue which affects the quality of recycled material

#### DO

Dispose of in general waste



### Glass cookware

#### WHY NOT

Tempered to withstand high temperature and therefore not easily broken down

#### DO

Donate to charity



### Dirty takeaway containers

#### WHY NOT

Food residue make them unrecyclable

#### DO

<u>Dispose</u> of in general waste



# Tissues & paper towels

#### WHY NOT

Easily contaminated and can clog up machinery

#### DO

Dispose of in general waste
